Autumn 2	Electoral Systems used in the UK	Students will learn about the nature of political power in the UK and the core concepts relating to democracy and government. Spring 1	Devolution & Democracy	Students will explore the role and structure of local government and understand the nature of regional and devolved governments in the U.K. Key terms: Devolution, Advocacy, Democracy, Equal opportunities.	Develop skills of research, analyse and evaluate the effectiveness of devolved regions of the U.K.	Exam style questions.
Spring 2	Life in Modern Britain	Students will learn about the principles and values in British society including the media and free press. Key terms: Equality, Tolerance, Individual liberty, values.	Develop skills of critical thinking about the positives and negatives of Modern Britain.	Exam style questions.
Summer 1	Planning a Campaign Citizenship in Action	Students will plan and execute a method to raise awareness or make a difference to an Citizenship issue of their choice.	Develop the skill of using various research methods, such as data collection, analysing data and able to influence key decision-makers. Evaluate their methods and how to improve.	Project portfolio
Summer 2	Principles and values in the British society	Students will consider how rights are protected, the nature of universal human rights and how the UK participates in international treaties and agreements. Key terms: Society, United Nations, Justice System, Cohesion.	Develop skills of research, analyse and evaluate different views about human rights.	Exam style questions.
